Great Lakes Water Levels Increasing. Global Warming Alarmists Still Claim They Will Fall!

For some time now, global warming alarmists have been squawking about how global warming will evaporate the Great Lakes to such a large



extent that it will totally change the ecology of the entire region of the U.S. and Canada. Here's an article (just one of many examples mind you) from the Detroit News more than a year back about how global warming will lower lake levels: Global warming may drop Great Lakes water levels (Thu May 29, 2008). Here's a snippet from that article:

The report draws on science about global warming to make predictions for the Great Lakes, such as:

- Climate change will boost daily high temperatures between 5.4 and 10.8 degrees.
- Warmer lakes will mean less ice cover and *lower water levels of 1 to 3 feet* in the next century.

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- Biological "dead zones," where plants and animals can't live, will spread.
- Intense storms will swamp stressed sewage treatment plants, forcing them to release raw and partially treated sewage into the lakes.

Unfortunately for the ignorant MSM, observable data contradicts their assertions and alarmism. I have pointed to data that the Great Lakes have seen increases in water levels, not decreases. Related to that topic are these former posts:

But hey - why let inconvenient observable data interfere with the narrative? The meme now is that the recovery is temporary and that global warming will still chop 3 feet off the Great Lakes and change the ecology of the entire region and parts of Canada. Groan. From The Detroit News: Great Lakes water levels rebound after long slump.

Great Lakes water levels are rebounding after a decade-long slump that hammered the maritime industry and even fed conspiracy theories about plots to drain the inland seas that make up nearly one-fifth of the world's fresh surface water.

The three biggest lakes -- Superior, Huron and Michigan -- have risen steadily since fall 2007, when for a couple of months Superior's levels were the lowest on record and the others nearly so. Erie, shallowest of the lakes, actually exceeded its long-term average in June. So did Lake Ontario, although its level is determined more by artificial structures than nature.

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

The lakes follow cycles, rising and falling over time. Scientists say it's a natural process with environmental benefits, such as replenishing coastal wetlands. But extreme ups or downs can wreak havoc for people.

During the mid-1980s, levels got so **high** that houses, businesses and even sections of roads were swept away along Lake Michigan's southeastern shoreline.

the past couple of years. Scientists attribute the rebound primarily to wetter, colder weather the past couple of years. But if grim computer modeling proves accurate, global warming will cause the lakes to recede up to 3 feet this century.

Now, you might be asking like I was - "WHERE THE HECK DID *THAT* COME FROM ???" Speaking of those "models," haven't they all proven to be crap? Like - totally junk? Why yes. Yes they have! How would one know this? Anyone recall this graphic from <u>WUWT</u> some time ago?: :



Every model that the IPCC had has been proven wrong. The global

temperature is right now outside the uncertainty bands around all those models. Well outside. Thus, the models aren't worth the hard drive platters they are printed on. But from the liberal point of view, why ruin a good narrative when it can be injected into an article such as this one right out of left field! Did the AP do their research before writing the article? Does the Detroit News understand what the heck is going into their publication? Aren't they all supposed to check and double-check their facts? The piece continues:

"Climate projections say the lakes will go up and down around a decreasing average," said Don Scavia, director of the University of Michigan's Graham Environmental Sustainability Institute. "The lows will be lower than in the past and the highs will be lower than in the past."

Records extending to the mid-1800s document a series of larger rises and dips at roughly 30-year intervals, said Craig Stow, a scientist with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Great Lakes Environmental Research Laboratory in Ann Arbor.



Os wasn't unexpected, but its suddenness and severity caught many off guard. Drought and warming temperatures didn't help as winter ice caps, crucial for limiting evaporation, formed in ever smaller areas.

Since fall 2007, rain and snow have picked up and

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
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Jack Hoogendyk's Blog Panel Discussion winters have been colder. The lakes had substantial ice cover during the 2008-09 winter, meteorologists say.

At the end of June, *Huron and Michigan* -- which hydrologically are one lake -- were 10 inches higher than the previous year. Erie had risen 5 inches, Superior was near the same level and Ontario was an inch lower. Ontario and Erie were 5 inches above their long-term averages, while the others were within 6 inches of theirs.

As for the data, 150 years of lake level data may not be nearly enough to predict what is happening, especially when only a few cyclical changes are observable. That and you have to wonder about data uncertainty from before the Civil War. Let's just look at what's been going on in Lake Michigan since that time:

This data does not include the recent upswing, but what is most

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
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to step into starting role

interesting to me is that the biggest decline in the average lake level *occurred before the industrial revolution*! In fact before the civil war! No SUVs. No coal power plants. No measurable carbon footprint. Yet, the observable data indicates that the lake level changed mostly when we had no effect via CO2 emissions, while the recent century has seen no average change even though our carbon footprint has went up substantially! Now let's take a look at Lake Huron:



Note here also that there was a substantial drop in the level from 1860 until about 1920, right in the heart of the industrial revolution. Since that time, as our carbon footprint increased very significantly, there is essentially no change in the lake level average. Thus, the quote in the Detroit News/AP article by the director of the University of Michigan's Graham Environmental Sustainability Institute that there is a decreasing mean is bunk! But even if it were true, the pattern extends into the past far beyond the industrial revolution when we simply could not have an effect by burning fossil fuels! So what caused *that*?
